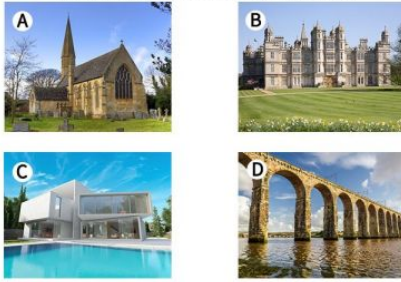

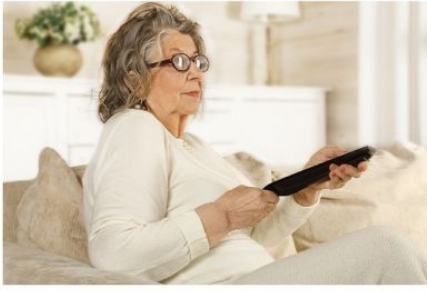

It's a tradition!

Britain has some strange traditions, some of them dating back to Roman times. One of the strangest is the annual cheese-rolling competition at Cooper's Hill in Gloucestershire. It began about 600 years ago – but no one really knows why – and takes place on the first Monday in May.



A previous winner of the competition.

Someone pushes a large round cheese off the top of Cooper's Hill and the competitors run after it. The object is to catch the cheese before it reaches the bottom of the hill (about 200 metres), but no one ever does because the cheese goes too fast. The winner is therefore the first person to get to the bottom of the hill (on their feet or not!), and the prize is the cheese. The competition can be dangerous but, as one competitor said, "Every year, people fall and hurt themselves, but we must keep the cheese-rolling tradition. And where's the fun if there's no risk?"
